#### **HEAT STROKE- and your DOG... IMPORTANT**

As the weather is getting warmer, it's important to know the signs of a Heat Stroke.

- ·Heavy panting and being unable to calm down, even when lying down.
- •Your pet's gums may be brick red, they may have a fast pulse rate, or they may not be able to get up.
- •If you think your pet has a heat stroke, take their temperature rectally. If the temperature is above 105 degrees Fahrenheit, you should cool your animal down by moving to a cool place in the shade or in an air-conditioned room.
- •If your pet is unsteady on its feet and you have moved it to a cooler location, you can start cooling it by placing cool water on the feet. Rubbing alcohol on the skin of your pet's stomach (with a fan blowing on the pet) can also aid in cooling.
- •While these steps are in progress, have someone call your veterinarian so that they can determine if you should bring your pet in for treatment.

## TESTING AND REPORTING GUIDELINES ABC Heath & Research Committee

Use and interpretation of tests should be in consultation with your veterinarian or veterinary specialist. These guidelines will be updated as further knowledge is gained.

Heart disease can be inherited or it can be caused by bacterial, viral or parasitic agents these are NOT inherited. The damage appears the same in some cases. A screening program can help determine the origin.

All hearts should be ausculted at each veterinary visit. This is particularly important prior to any surgery, including ear cropping. If a murmur is detected the dog should be evaluated to determine the cause and significance of the murmur. Murmurs may be innocent ("flow" murmurs) or may be an indication of structural heart disease such as aortic stenosis, sub aortic stenosis, septal defects or defects of the mitral, tricuspid or pulmonic valves. Echo with Doppler measurements can accurately find and diagnose the origin of murmurs which cannot always be heard or reliably pinpointed by auscultation alone.

- 1. Maximum flow values have recently been reevaluated and raised to 2.4 IF there is no evidence of structural causes. The cardiologist should determine if the flow value for an individual Boxer is of concern. Current information is that AS/SAS may develop upon sexual maturity in dogs that were previously tested clear, thus the new recommendation for 24 mos. minimum age. Boxer Cardiomyopathy is a complex condition that is still under study.
- 2. Thyroid panel must include the following tests: **TGAA** (Thyroglobulin auto antibodies), **Total T4AA**, **Free T4AA** (by equilibrium dialysis), **cTSH**. (Optional tests include T3 and free T3)
- 3. Because these results can change over time, or because the age at testing may be significant, it is essential to list the date of the most recent test in each case. There are no normal values for some of the recommended tests, and there can be differing opinions between experts in the field.

## Ticks! Yuck!

Some smells, like citronella, are an instant "yuck" for me. These two homemade tick repellents have smells I can handle AND are cheap enough to be worth a try. I have used peppermint oil (a drop or two on a dog's neck) and it really does help repel mosquito bites also. I'm thinking this peppermint spray below would be even better and not as strong. So what if the dog smells like a candy cane!

Ticks are not fond of citrus, so you can make a citrus tick repellent. Boil 2 cups of water and add any combination of 2 sliced citrus fruits: lemons, limes, oranges, or grapefruit. Allow the mixture to boil for about a minute, then simmer for one hour. Remove the fruit and put the liquid through a strainer.

Pour into a spray bottle and use on your skin, your pet's fur, and on your lawn.

Combine 16 ounces of water and 20 to 25 crops of peppermint essential oil in a spray bottle and spritz onto clothing, your dog's fur, and your lawn.


Most essential oils are toxic to cats and should not be used to repel ticks. The natural tick repellents using vinegar, citrus, and neem leaves should be safe, but talk to your vet before using any type of tick repellent on your cat.


